Course Description:

This is a non-credit, open enrollment life skills course within the Adult Education Department that is designed for students who have basic English language skills. Students will learn and communicate in everyday situations and build a larger vocabulary through listening, speaking, reading, writing and grammar activities. There will be emphasis on comprehending simple conversations, communicating survival needs, reading phrases and simple sentences, and performing communicative written tasks. This summer class requires 5 hours of asynchronous work per week. This course requires the use of Canvas and a device with reliable access to the internet. Additionally, third party applications may be used. This class meets Face-to-Face on Saddleback College Campus during all of the days/times that are listed on the course schedule.

Student Learning Outcomes (SLO):

- 1. Demonstrate achievement in reading comprehension through CASAS reading score of 201 or higher.
- 2. Demonstrate achievement in listening through a CASAS listening score of 200 or higher.
- 3. Recognize acceptable cultural norms in the United States and compare those of a different country.

Learning Objectives:

Course Content - Learning Objectives

Upon completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Identify or use appropriate language for informational purposes (e.g., to identify, describe, ask for information, state needs, command, agree or disagree, ask permission)
- 2. Identify or use various methods to purchase goods and services, and make returns and

- exchanges
- 3. Identify driving regulations and procedures to obtain a driver's license Identify emergency numbers and place emergency calls
- 4. Communicate with a doctor or other medical staff regarding condition, diagnosis, treatment, concerns, etc.
- 5. Identify procedures involved in interviewing for a job, such as arranging for an interview, acting and dressing appropriately, and selecting appropriate questions and responses
- 6. Analyze information about the structure of government and the political system, including federal, state and local Identify information needed to solve a given problem (ask for cross streets in order to navigate to a given location)
- 7. Identify or make inferences through inductive and deductive reasoning to hypothesize, predict, conclude, and synthesize (after listening to a portion of a reading passage, student will make predictions on conclusion of passage)
- 8. Distinguish fact from opinion, and determine what is mandatory and what is discretionary

Grading Policy:

Students will receive one of the following noncredit grades at the end of the semester. Grading will be determined based on participation, assignments, and weekly assessments.

- Pass(P)
- Satisfactory Progress (SP)
- No Pass (NP)

Activities

- Participate in class activities: dialogues, discussions, reviews, and lectures. Additionally, this summer class requires 5 hours of asynchronous work per week

Assignments

- Complete assignments on time, independently, and use lecture notes as a reference as needed.
 - Review lecture notes daily (increases understanding of lecture topics)
 - Write and edit new lecture notes in your notebook after each class (increases understanding of lecture topics)
 - Listen & repeat dialogues to improve pronunciation, increase listening skills, and develop vocabulary
 - Speaking: say dialogues aloud in front of a mirror (improves speaking skills and increases confidence)
 - Weekly Skills Review & Practice: grammar, listening, pronunciation, reading, speaking, writing, & Burlington English activities (increase understanding and develop your English fluency skills)
 - This summer class requires 5 hours of asynchronous work per week. This course requires the use of Canvas and a device with reliable access to the internet.

 Additionally, third party applications may be used. This class meets Face-to-Face on Saddleback College Campus during all of the days/times that are listed on the

course schedule.

Methods of grading

The total number of points possible per week are 100. The total number of points possible per Summer term are 900. Students can also complete the Extra Credit assignment to earn an additional 100 points to help with the final grade.

- Participation (in class and online) 33% / 33 points per week / 11 points per day attended
- Assignments 33% / 33 points per week
- Assessments, Exams, Tests, and Quizzes 34% / 34 points per week




